The 1983 season was the most successful playing year in the TEM Caulfield Hockey Club's history. Highlights of the year included -

B SOUTH COACH'S REPORT WOMEN

Season 1983 should be the turning point for the Ladies section and their future should be looked forward to with great optimism in 1984. The team completed the season in 2nd position achieving their highest position ever in competition. The players and team administration (Coach, Manager and Stats) put in a tremendous amount of work, learning new skills and team plays necessary to achieve their position.

With the new grading system to be implemented for season 1984 (A1, A2 and A3 only) they had a strong chance to be promoted as the best 2nd team in 'B1 grades. This theory proved to be incorrect as only the first placed teams and premier teams were promoted.

Although this is a great disappointment for all those who tried so hard, we have to accept that the MWHA have decreed we are not ready for this promotion. Unlike the teams that have been promoted, we do not have consistency of achievement in 'B' grade nor do we have the back up teams to support our No.1 team. Results over past three years in our B, C & D teams show a very poor supportive group,

The primary cause being lack of correct coaching to players of playing skills and team plays required, along with a total misconception of playing positions and what each player is required to do in the position they play. Correction of these problems must be treated as a matter of extreme urgency for 1984. Each player should be given a complete skills assessment, complete tuition in player positions and their roles. Each team should be given proper tuition in team play requirements and each team should have a qualified coach to give this information. Each coach should complete, as minimum requirement, the Level 1 coaching course. Only after these points have been attempted can we expect the grade status.

But it does not end there - to support the on field efforts an administration that has their job requirements fully understood and a working committee that does the job in a properly organised manner and not one that learns as they go. That type of committee only disrupts everyone. Let's organise now for 1984 by clearly arranging complete job descriptions for all administration positions and appointing people prepared to do that job in a professional manner.

I hope I have given the girls and ladies under my control a better understanding of the game in areas of skills and team play requirements and hope that they have enjoyed 1983 and that they will be better prepared in knowledge to tackle 1984.

I would like to thank Val Heath (Manager) Alan Halbert (Stats), pam Allan (Captain), Mary Lofthouse (V.Captain), Fiona Norling (Chairman of Selectors) for their support, without which I could not have done my job as the team coach I wish all players the best of luck for the future and please continue to enjoy your chosen sport. More enjoyment comes as you acquire knowledge, keep watching and learning - then do it!

The challenge for 1984 is to finish in No.1 position at completion of home and away fixture matches - this is the only way to be promoted in any grade of womens hockey - we cannot change these rules, so this must be our aim for 1984.
