

#### TEM Caulfield Hockey Club (Inc)

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the TEM Caulfield Hockey Club (Inc) held at Lords Reserve Pavilion, Munro Avenue, Carnegie on Sunday 8th November, 1987, commencing at 11.05 a.m.

The President, John MacPhie, chaired the meeting. There were thirty seven members present.

#### 1. Opening by President

- 1.1 The President declared the meeting open and welcomed those present. He then called for apologies, which were received from:

  Philip Davrain, Alan Henderson, Maxine Keneally, Fiona Norling, Sandra Penpraze.
- 2. Minutes of 1986 Annual General Meeting
- 2.1 The President pointed out that, as requested the previous year, the Minutes of the 1986 meeting had been included in the AGM report.
- 2.2 J. Muller/L. Penpraze moved:
  "That the Minutes of the 1986 Annual General Meeting be confirmed".

- 2.3 No one sought to raise any matter arising from the Minutes, but the President invited members to raise matters in General Business if they wished.

#### Report by Treasurer

- 3.1 The Treasurer spoke briefly to the papers contained in the AGM Report. It was noted that the recoupment of astroturf playing/training costs constituted a major problem, which the new committee would have to look at seriously.
- 3.2 Ian MacPhee pointed out that receipts from sale of clothing had dropped considerably and it was agreed that this matter be further considered in the next year.
- 3.3 W. Penpraze/M. Taylor moved:
  "That the financial statements prepared by the Treasurer for the year ended 31st October, 1987 be adopted."

4.1 The President pointed out that written reports on the activities of the divisions of the club were contained in the papers already distributed. He invited members to put any questions under general business.

#### 5. Elections

#### NOTE 1

The accounts have been prepared on a historical cost accrual basis.

#### NOTE 2

During the 1986/7 year \$2,000 was transferred from Members Equity to the Synthetic Ground Reserve to be specifically set aside for the club's synthetic hockey surface.

#### NOTE 3

The assets are valued in the following manner:Assets acquired prior to 1/11/83 have been valued on the historical cosbasis less an allowance for dimunition in value to 31/10/84. Fixed assets acquired after 31/10/84 have been valued at historical cost.
Depreciation has been provided using the straight line method.

#### TREASURERS REPORT

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST OCTOBER, 1988

The financial year ended 31st October, 1988 has not been a successful year for the club from a financial point of view with the reported loss of \$1,950. Although this loss cannot be specifically attributed to any one area or division of the club it does provide an indication of the costs of running and administrating a club of size of T.E.M.C.

The clubs finances are being continually eroded by the greater use of synthetic grounds for both playing and training. This is having a twofold effect on the club. Firstly, due to the scheduling of games it is becoming increasingly difficult for club members to get together at the clubrooms and social occasions. This fact is reflected in the bar takings and the social/fund raising revenues reported for the year. Secondly, to stay one of the premier clubs in Australia, the need to train and play on synthetic grounds is a must. However, this does require an enormous outlay for the club.

A review of the clubs accounts highlight the following aspects:-

- revenues from fees for playing and training on synthetic grounds increased by \$4,469
- expenses incurred for playing and training on synthetic grounds increased by \$2,228
  - a shortfall of \$1,002 was incurred on social activities.
  - the indoor competition netted the club \$1,369
- the club assisted members with \$2,100 for state team representations, medical costs and club shirts.
- winter affliation fees to the various associations included this year a levy for our Olympic team.
  - fines levied by associations increased dramatically.
- the club has in stock a number of uniforms etc. for resale in the next few years.

From a revenue point of view the club must widen the areas from which it attracts funds. It must involve more outside people as sponsors and in fund raising efforts, however, continue to operate on the pay as you play or train principle.

In conclusion I wish to thank the other members of the committee for their help during the season, particularly Phil Burchardt, Ian McPhee, Mary Lofthouse, Grant McPhie and Wendy Penpraze together with club members Barry Penpraze and Joe Hough. It is through the efforts othese people the club has been able to maintain its financial basis.

## PRESIDENTS' REPORT.

Taking over the Presidency the year after the most outstandingly successful season the club has ever enjoyed could on one view be seen as a serious error of judgement. Not surprisingly, 1988 has been less successful than the champagne year 1987.

Nonetheless I don't regret it at all. The year has been one of consolidation both on and off the field. In the mens' division we have won two premierships, thus regaining our Pennant A and Pennant C teams, and the top Veterans team has stayed in the top grade despite losing all its first round games.

In the womens' division, Melbourne League 1 paid the penalty for a too slow start but did enough to indicate that they can bounce back up again and, next time, stay up. The other sides all finished in or relatively close to the four.

In juniors, all sides were competitive and our success was reflected in continuing selections in state junior teams.

And to cap off the season, Joe Hough won the State League 1 Fairest and Best competition for the first time.

Off the field, the club's committee wrestled with administrative difficulties and in my opinion produced some excellent results.

Slowly but surely we are getting to grips with the financial and administrative nightmare of artificial turfs, and the arrangements for paying club fees at the beginning of the season rather than at the end, was very successful. It will be repeated next year. So too with the club membership forms which, while in some respects clumsily drafted, are still of great assistance in enabling the club to function.

It is conventional at this time to thank those who have helped during the year, but it is not convention that leads me to do so.

I would like to record my heartfelt thanks to all the people who in greater or lesser measure have participated in running the club this year. This includes all the committee members, all the team captains coaches and managers and all the other active enthusiasts who have contributed during the year. It is a measure of the quality of the TEMC Club that I do not intend to list them all as the list would be too long for convenient reprinting, and it would be unfair and invidious to those whom I would inevitably overlook.

I must however thank the club's committee members, all of whom have provided tremendous support.

TEMC women enjoyed a relatively successful season this year under senior coach Arthur Hodges. Although our successes were a little quieter than in previous years, we did manage to have two of our teams in the finals series.

This season was really quite a milestone for the womens section of the club. It is ten years since the womens section of TEMC got off the ground with only two teams - (one in D grade & one team in E grade).
